PASTOR'S REFLECTION

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time "Leave me, Lord! I am a sinful man."

Isaiah 6:1-2a, 3-8, 1 Corinthians 15:1-11, Luke 5:1-11

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Blessings to you on this 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time!

Just four days ago, I celebrated my 26th Anniversary of priestly ordination, an occasion that filled my heart with gratitude and reflection. I am reminded of the profound words of Simon Peter in today's Gospel: "Leave me, Lord! I am a sinful man."

These words resonate not only with my own journey but also with the themes of today's readings: Isaiah's prophetic call. Paul's reflection on the resurrection, and the miraculous catch of fish in Luke's Gospel.

The First Reading, from Prophet Isaiah (6:1-8), reveals a powerful moment of encounter between the prophet and the Divine. Isaiah stands before the Lord in the temple, overwhelmed by God's holiness and his own unworthiness. "Woe is me! I am a man of unclean lips." he cries out.

Yet, despite our unworthiness, God purifies and calls Isaiah to a greater purpose. This illuminates the duality of God's recognition of our sinfulness and His relentless desire to use us for His glory. In my own life, I often feel like Isaiah, realizing my inadequacies, yet feeling the unmistakable call to serve.

In the Second Reading, from the 1st Letter of Paul to the Corinthians (15:1-11), we encounter Paul, who acknowledges his past as a persecutor of the Church. He describes himself as the least of the apostles, a man unworthy of the grace he received.

Paul's transformation serves as a testament that no one is beyond the reach of God's mercy. Just as I have often reflected on my own sinfulness, Paul's words remind us that our past does not define us. Rather, it is through God's grace that we find our purpose and strength. It's not about our worthiness but about God's unwavering love for us—even in the depths of our failures.

In the Gospel, from Luke (5:1-11), we witness Peter's encounter with Jesus at the Sea of Galilee. After a night of fruitless fishing, Peter obeys Jesus' command to cast his nets once more.

The resulting catch is miraculous, leaving Peter overwhelmed and confessing, "Leave me, Lord! I am a sinful man!" Yet, Jesus does not leave him; instead, He calls Peter to a life of discipleship.

This narrative reflects the very essence of our faith journey: it's often in our moments of despair and recognition of our inadequacies that Jesus invites us into something greater, urging us to trust in His power rather than our own ability.

As we consider these readings today, let us acknowledge the duality of our experience—our sinfulness and God's boundless mercy. God sees within us the potential for greatness, even when we are blinded by our faults. He calls us not to dwell in the shadow of shame but to step into the light of His love and purpose.

Today, I invite you to reflect on your own lives. When you encounter your weaknesses and feel unworthy, remember that our Lord sees your potential. He invites you to go out into the deep waters of faith, to trust in Him wholeheartedly. Just as I have had to confront my own limitations as a priest, you, too, are called to entrust your lives to God.

Let us, then, echo the words of Peter, fully aware of our limitations, but emboldened by His presence. "Lord, I am not worthy, I am a sinful man/woman. But, do not leave me. Instead, only say the word, and I shall be healed."

May we open our hearts to the life-changing power of God's love, allowing Him to work through our imperfections and failures, leading us toward His perfect will.

As we participate in this Eucharistic feast, let us prepare to receive Him, acknowledging both our need for mercy and our readiness to follow wherever He may lead.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



THEME: Responding to the Call: Embracing Stewardship through Faith and Service.

As we gather in reflection and community, I would like to share some insights on Stewardship—an essential aspect of our faith—as illustrated in the Sacred scriptures.

The readings from Isaiah, 1 Corinthians, and Luke remind us of the call to service and the commitment we are invited to make in our spiritual journey.

In my priesthood, I have encountered both the joys and challenges of stewardship, and I wish to share three vital lessons we can draw from these readings.

Lesson 1: The Call to Holiness and Service (Isaiah 6:1-8)

In Isaiah's vision, we see a profound encounter with God that leads to a divine calling. Isaiah, upon witnessing the glory of the Lord, is acutely aware of his sinfulness and the need for purification.

When he hears God's voice asking, "Whom shall I send?" he responds, "Here I am! Send me." This moment beautifully exemplifies our own calls to holiness and service.

Stewardship begins with recognizing our need for God's grace and holiness. As parishioners, we are called not only to receive God's blessings but also to be instruments of that grace in the world.

Being stewards means offering our time, talents, and resources for God's mission. Let us take the same willingness that Isaiah exhibited and ask ourselves how we can respond to God's call in our daily lives.

Lesson 2: The Reality of Our Transformation (1 Corinthians 15:1-11)

In this passage, Paul reflects on the transformative power of the resurrection, emphasizing its foundation for the Christian faith. He speaks of how the early believers witnessed the risen Christ, acknowledging their own imperfections and changes they experienced because of their faith.

Stewardship requires a willingness to embrace transformation. Just as the apostles were transformed from fearful individuals to bold proclaimers of the Gospel, our journey of stewardship involves growth.

Paul's message reminds us that regardless of our past, we can be changed by God's love and grace. This transformation prompts us to be active participants in our community, using our resources to serve others and spread the message of Christ.

Lesson 3: The Abundance of God's Provision (Luke 5:1-11)

In the story of the miraculous catch of fish, we witness Jesus calling the disciples. After a night of futile fishing, Peter and his companions follow Jesus' instructions, resulting in an overwhelming catch. This powerful moment illustrates both Jesus' authority and the abundance that follows faith-filled action.

God provides abundantly when we respond to His call through stewardship. Often, we may feel weary or inadequate, like Peter after a long night of fishing.

However, when we trust in Christ and act as good stewards of what we have—our time, talents, and resources—we discover God's bounteous blessings.

This passage reassures us that through our willingness to serve, we will never be left wanting. It's vital to extend this abundance, sharing generously with our communities as a testimony of our faith.


Conclusion
